<p>7 am – 8 am Breakfast Provided</p>	<p><u>Situational-awareness: Active Shooter by Jack McGrath, Ph.D.</u> (1 CME)</p> <p>Learn how to be proactive in an active shooter situation. What do I do - run – hide – fight? This presentation will provide an overview of your personal security and safety as well as an awareness of threats in the work environment. What becomes of the patient-physician relationship if the patient behavior is challenging or violent? What if a co-worker or practice partner becomes violent? What is the potential impact to others, patients or co-workers, if an Active Shooter incident occurs in your practice? You will learn how to be aware of potential violent situations in the health care setting. Hear an overview on Active Shooters in the US and workplace violence in the United States. What indicators do you need to look for? You will leave this presentation with an overview of your situation and an awareness as it relates to your safety along with fellow employee and patient safety. Learn safety through situational awareness, training, creating proactive emergency action plans and create partnerships.</p>
<p>8 am – 9 am</p>	<p><u>Non-accidental Trauma in Children by Mary Beth Deering, MD</u> (1 CME)</p> <p>Federal law defines child abuse and neglect by the following definition: ‘at a minimum, any act or failure to act resulting in imminent risk of serious harm, death, or serious physical or emotional harm, sexual abuse, or exploitation of a child by a parent or caretaker who is responsible for the child’s welfare’.</p> <p>According to the National Child Abuse and Neglect Data System published in 2007, 3.6 million cases of abuse or neglect were investigated. Of those just under 900,000 were proven abuse. And 1,460 of the cases resulted in the death of a child. This session will help you understand the signs of physical abuse that are highly suspicious with the clear pathway for reporting and managing non-accidental trauma.</p>
<p>9 am – 10 am Lunch Provided</p>	<p><u>Physician Compensation from the Physician Perspective by Todd Welter</u> (1 CME)</p> <p>Mr. Welter will provide valuable information on different payer reimbursement models and how they are used to encourage and discourage certain identified behaviors. Learn about transitioning from volume-based to value-based approach to providing patient care. What is value-based care and how is it measured? Learn about risk and attribution and the impact on practice finances . Do providers and health insurers have different definitions of value-based care? What does this mean for your practice including patients, staff and practice partners? Also hear the pros and cons of MIPS and the impact to your practice. Other topics include internal accounting and compensation based on overall cost and profitability.</p>
<p>10 am – 11 am</p>	<p><u>The Weinstein Effect by LaNee Reynolds</u> (1 CME, 1 COPIC Point)</p> <p>On October 5, 2017, The New York Times broke the story of sexual harassment and misconduct claims against Harvey Weinstein. In the 31 days following the article, over 20 prominent men were either fired, resigned or black listed due to sexual harassment, misconduct and mistreatment of women allegations. The allegations of sexual harassment in the workplace continue to pour in and at a fiercer rate than ever before. We will discuss why the Weinstein effect is happening and what practices should do to protect their employees, their physicians, and the practice.</p> <p>During this session you will learn to identify the changing factors that have given the Weinstein Effect its momentum; analyze real events / scenarios that have come through the HR Hotline at COPIC, and how to mitigate exposure to harassment complaints.</p>
<p>11 am – 12 pm</p>	<p><u>PACE Program by Shannon Keel, MD</u> (1 CME)</p> <p>Participants will understand the need for a broad range of services for our elderly population. Attend this session to gain a broad understanding of the PACE model including understanding which patients are appropriate for PACE and how to refer patients to PACE. Learn how the practice can interface with PACE.</p>
